

Research Assistance Grant

The Archaeological Society of Alberta (ASA) offers Research Assistance Grants of up to \$5,000 to support projects that advance archaeological understanding in Alberta. Applicants must be ASA members with confirmed ASA Centre support and may use funds for project expenses like wages for assistants, transportation, consumables, and analytical costs. However, capital equipment purchases or wages for the applicant are ineligible. Successful applicants must produce a written report suitable for publication and provide a detailed financial accounting. Applications are reviewed twice annually, with deadlines on January 15 and September 15.

Special Activity Grant

The Archaeological Society of Alberta (ASA) offers Special Activity Grants of up to \$5,000 to support events and initiatives that promote archaeology, such as workshops, conferences, artifact identification projects, and science fair participation, etc. Applicants must be ASA members with confirmed support from their ASA Centre. Eligible expenses include speaker honoraria, travel, lodging, facility rentals, supplies, and advertising, though capital equipment purchases and applicant wages are excluded. Recipients must submit a financial report and provide an article for publication in the Alberta Archaeological Review or the ASA Newsletter. Applications are accepted twice a year, with deadlines on January 15 and September 15.

John Dormaar Award

The Archaeological Society of Alberta (ASA) established the John Dormaar Award to honor Johan (John) Dormaar's legacy (1930–2011) and his contributions to Alberta archaeology and related disciplines. This award recognizes individuals who have significantly advanced understanding and appreciation in these fields through a substantive written work, whether for professional or general audiences. Eligible submissions include publications in journals, books, or magazines, as well as manuscripts, presentations, or visual arts. Nominees must be ASA members in good standing, with a focus on multi-disciplinary research, particularly in Northwestern North America. The recipient, announced at the ASA Annual General Meeting, receives \$1,000 and an inscribed parchment. The nomination deadline is February 1 annually.

ASA Distinguished Service Award

The Archaeological Society of Alberta (ASA) presents the Distinguished Service Award annually to recognize members who have made long-term, outstanding contributions to the Society and the field of archaeology in Alberta. Eligible nominees must be ASA members in good standing and have demonstrated exceptional service at both local and provincial levels, enhanced public awareness and education about Alberta archaeology, and promoted the Society's mission. The award is announced at the Annual General Meeting, with the recipient receiving a framed scroll certificate signed by the provincial President and Secretary. Nominations, including a letter of support, are due by the end of the calendar year.




"War is Their Sole Delight": New Discoveries at DgOw-32, Verdigris Coulee, Milk River,

Southern Alberta



Abstract

logow-32 has a long and checkered research history, from its initial recording by Selwyn Dewdney in 1962 to later work by Keyser in 1976 and Klassen (who rappelled down to the main panel) in 1993. No one, however, had ever seen or recorded all the images scattered across three major panels at the site until our work when we used a drone to record the complete extent of DgOw-32 in October of 2019. Our project, conducted under permit from Writing-on-Stone Provincial Park and monitored by Bob Dawe, located three major rock art loci (corresponding to-but greatly expanding on-the three panels designated by previous researchers) containing more than 350 rock art elements. More than half of these had not been previously recognized or published in the Plains rock art literature. The site itself is the key Northwestern Plains example for establishing the chronology of Plains Biographic rock art, given the presence of several scenes involving boat-form horses, horse armor, shield-bearing warriors, V-neck humans, and guns. Our research helps refine that chronology and supports earlier interpretations made from previous recordings. It also adds numerous images to the Plains Biographic art lexicon, and provides some of the best action scenes known for early Blackfort higraphic art



Abstract

while ongoing efforts are devoted to de-extinct this ioonic Ice Age creature. The recent discovery of ancient DNA from mammoths found in frozen ground in Siberia and Canada indicates the existence of mainland mammoths less than 10,000 years ago. This evidence extends the temporal gap between human arrival and mammoth extinction. This talk will explore several case studies investigating mammoths in Alaska, all aiming to shed light on the timing and potential causes of their extinction. We will finish with the "Adopt a Mammoth" project, initiated in 2022, which is actively searching for the last mammoth on mainland Alaska. Supported by public donations, Colosal Biosciences, and a new NSF project, this study is systematically radiocarbon dating and analyzing the ancient DNA of nearly 1,500 mammoth specimens at the University of Alaska Museum of the North. Exciting new findings from this project will be shared. The talk will conclude with a free raffle that will award three attendees present in person the adoption of their very own mammoth, bringing the past alive.


